Last week I tweeted that Roberto Luongo shouldn't garner more than Tyler Bozak and a 2nd round pick in a trade. As far as value is concerned, I think Luongo is worth far more - not Jake Gardiner

and a 1st...but close to it. But at the long-term contract that he has, I think it's a matter of supply vs. demand. Right now, under current CBA rules, if Luongo were waived, he would be surprised to see 22 or 25 teams just pass on him. Right off the bat, approximately (I'll say) 24 teams would shy away. Between the contract length, and already being set in goal, these teams would have no interest in him for free. Of the six teams who remain, two of them would only take him because he's free. This leaves four teams willing to actually cough up assets for Luongo. So what's the value of saving the Canucks from being tied down for another 10 years? That has a TON of value. In my books, if I'm Mike Gillis, I look at being rescued from salary cap problems in 2019 (or 2020, or 2021) as a better asset coming my way than a first-round pick.

Just look at the precedents. The Predators gave up a top defenseman prospect in <u>Cody</u> <u>Franson</u>

just to get out from under two years of paying \$3.5 million to a player who wasn't (they felt) going to help the team anymore. And since they took on Brett Lebda

's million bucks back, it wasn't even for two full years. It was for a season and a half of salary, they gave up Franson. Ignoring Franson's performance last year and just looking at this the way his status as a prospect was at the time. Just for 1.5 years of mediocre salary getting off the books.

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So what's the value of three years? Assuming Luongo is useful for seven.

Let's give the trade, ignoring salary, a value. Frattin, Gardiner, Bozak and a first is too much. But downgrade Gardiner and perhaps you have something. Maybe <u>Jesse Blacker</u>? That may be slightly too little, but let's take that as the equal trade - Luongo for Frattin, Blacker, Bozak and a first. Now we need to remove the value of three years worth of useless contract. We've already established, if we're Brian Burke, that 1.5 years is worth a top d-man prospect. So scratch out Blacker. Now let's scratch out the first and make it a second. That should cover two years of the three. All I'm saying now is Frattin has to be removed to finish off the balance. Did I remove too much? Well, since my only competition is Chicago (not in a comfortable cap position) and Florida (doesn't really want or need Luongo), then I'm holding firm on Bozak and a second.

I had Luongo for Toronto <u>several months ago</u>. In fact, if I opened a Twitter account and called it @hhockeyinssiderr I would have tweeted it, and soon I'd get to claim credit for it, gaining me 100,000 followers! One of these days I'm going to do that - start a rumor twitter account (anonymous) and show you how logic and paying close attention to the pulse of NHL hockey can make you one of the better "insiders" on the internet. As soon as I feel like wasting time on something like that, you'll see...

Those wondering about Florida prospect Rocco Grimaldi - he underwent knee surgery way back in January and hadn't been on the ice for months. He's back for North Dakota now, and after lighting it up during the exhibition games (with linemate Danny Kristo), he has a point in each of the first two games. Grimaldi has tremendous upside, but you're looking at a Nathan Gerbe kind of wait on him.
