Particularly in light of the shortened season, my warm ups would be an integral part of my workout and pre game and practice routine. I would include a good 20 minute warm up focused on foam rolling, dynamic movement and mobility exercises, neural activation through foot work, and lastly activation of key muscle groups such as the glutes, shoulders and core.

That guy in goal is Devan Dubnyk, who proved to an awful lot of people Thursday, that he can

be a starting NHL goalie. I know it's only seven games into this 48-game season but Thursday's game with the unbeaten Sharks (7-0) was an acid test for Dubnyk because he had beaten the Phoenix Coyotes 2-1 in overtime one night earlier and was probably tired. Dubnyk stared down one of the best teams in the league on short rest and was stunningly good, early and late, before Michal Handzus worked his shootout magic for the Sharks. Handzus is 18 for 34 lifetime on shootouts. The Zamboni might be faster in five-on-five situations but Zeus might be the best shootout player ever with his ridiculously long reach.
