


Former NCAA goalie Jordan Sigalet, now the goalie coach with the Abbotsford Heat, also



My latest fitness post – how to make your training in the gym more "hockey specific."
One suggestion:
For core training, focus on rotational power and stability. Ditch the sit-ups and crunches. Work on explosive power with med ball work (if your gym allows it), or use the cables. Learn how to plank and side plank properly – they are very beneficial exercises but most people don't do them correctly. And don't forget that your "core" is always working when you are exercising,





Had Gudbranson not gotten injured, he likely would have joined the Rampage for training camp in September. Gudbranson is now eligible to play minor league hockey even during the lockout. Only Gudbranson got hurt. And, because the injury didn't happen on the ice, he's locked out and not being paid — like everyone else. Gudbranson's injury had been shrouded in secrecy as teammates declined to talk about it, saying "you need to speak with Erik." On Monday, Gudbranson finally came public about how he got hurt, telling The Miami Herald it happened while wakeboarding on a lake in Ontario with his buddies.



My latest for DefendingBigD — what will <u>Jamie Benn</u> 's next contract look like? Depends a lot on what the new CBA includes, but we have a general idea of a few of the contract provisions.

If Benn were to sign a six-year contract next month (please take a big leap of faith and assume the lockout is over by then), his contract would carry him to the age of 29, eating up one year of his UFA eligibility (where under the old CBA it would have eaten up two). What many teams have done in the past is given RFAs more money on a contract that brings them one year short of their UFA eligibility, allowing these teams to have one more negotiation process with the player as an RFA.
